County of New Haven. } ss: On this 17th day of June,
A. D. 1865, personally appeared before me Edward
R. Sandow, Judge of the Court of Probate for the
District of Guilford, a Court of Record in the County
and State aforesaid, Deborah S. Field, a resident
of Guilford, in the County of New Haven, and State
of Connecticut, aged twenty two years, who,
being first duly sworn according to law, doth on
her oath make the following declaration, in order
to obtain the benefit of the provision made by the
Act of Congress approved July 14, 1862: granting Pensions.

That she is the widow of Edmund J. Field, who
was private in Company I. commanded by Captain
Isaac R. Bronson, in the 14th Regiment of
Connecticut Volunteers, in the war of 1861, who
died near Harpers Ferry, in the State of Virginia,
from wounds received at the battle of Antietam,
on or about the 19th day of September, A. D. 1862,
while in the service of the United States.

She further declares that she was married to the
said Edmund J. Field on the 9th day of April,
in the year eighteen hundred and sixty two; that
her husband, the aforesaid Edmund J. Field, died
on the day above mentioned, and that she has
remained a widow ever since that period, as will more
fully appear by reference to the proof hereto annexed.

She also declares that she has not in any manner

been engaged in, or aided or abetted, the rebellion in the United States. That the following is the name and age of the child of the said deponent, and the said Edmund S. Field, now living, who was born after the death of the said husband, viz:

Hattie Louisa Field aged 2 years.

Davidson residents of Guilford, in the County of New-Haven, and State of Connecticut, persons whom I certify to be respectable and entitled to credit, and who, being by me duly sworn, say that they were present and saw the said Deborah S. Field sign her name to the foregoing declaration; and they further swear that they have every reason to believe, from the appearance of the applicant and their acquaintance with her, that she is the identical person she represents herself to be, and that they have no interest in the prosecution of this claim;
